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SMALL ISLAND, BIG IDEAS

OUTSIDE IN SERIES LAUNCHED

From Aotea Great Barrier Island, Aotearoa New Zealand - Welcome to Small Island, Big Ideas, an ongoing festival of conversations and events created to take Aotea, and possibly the world, forward.

Thanks to input from many of those in our own community, we have scoured the globe to find other small islands, similar in size to our own, who've had a big idea that's led to some sort of radical reinvention.

We are interested in how other small islands are facing the future. How have they acted on a 'big idea' that's transformed their island community in a positive way? We will be sharing those conversations and learnings on this podcast for the next few months one small island at a time.

First, we set off for Samsø, Denmark. We met Søren Hermansen, Director of the Energy Academy on the island. Samsø, located in Denmark's Kattegat Sea, had historically relied on imported fossil fuels for energy. However, in the early 2000s, the island launched an ambitious strategy to achieve complete energy independence and carbon neutrality through renewable energy sources. They met their objectives and became the world's first energy renewable island, and have been carbon neutral for years! They achieved energy self-sufficiency through community-owned wind turbines, solar panels, and biomass facilities. They export 80,000 megawatt hours of natural energy every year back to the mainland, with the proceeds flowing back into their community. We took a deep dive with Søren, a born and bred local, to learn about the island's energy ownership journey and community involvement. Today, they have 45 electric car charging stations, as well as a new hybrid community-owned ferry and another fully electric one coming next year! Samsø is a real-life example of how small islands can thrive and become global leaders.

MESSAGE FROM AOTEA HEALTH

Firstly, we wish to give some clarity around the differences between Aotea Health Ltd and the Great Barrier Island Community Health Trust (GBICHT). These are two completely separate entities.

In July 2023, Darcy and I bought the business – Aotea Health Ltd, from Leonie, Adele and the late Ivan. Aotea Health Ltd has contracts with DHB/Te Whatu Ora (TWO) to provide health services to the residents and visitors on Aotea. The business is partially funded by the DHB/TWO, with the remainder coming from patient fees. (This is not new as it has been this way for many years.)

The GBICHT is a Community Health Trust – that owns and maintains the buildings (Community Health Centre in Claris and the Nurses Cottage in Port FitzRoy) the vehicles and all of the equipment in these buildings to provide healthcare. The GBICHT is governed by a group of Trustees comprised of elected community representatives, Iwi, and Clinical representatives. Aotea Health Ltd (ie: Darcy and Tania Kemp) are leasing the buildings, the equipment and the vehicles and will lease the new premises the GBICHT is currently building.

The second area we want to clarify is around patient fees. We have NOT increased any standard consult fees since buying the business in July 2023.

As you may have read or seen on TV recently, the Government has recommended that General Practices increase their fees by \$10 (\$19.50 to \$29.50) for non-Community Service Card holders (CSC) in order to make up for the increase in costs that they will not cover. We are choosing NOTTO increase fees this year for any of our registered patients. It is likely that we will increase the fee to the recommended \$29.50 next year, but only for registered patients without a community services card.

As it has always been, visitors and non-registered patients pay a higher fee for service than registered patients. Why? Because we get no funding from TWO to provide this care for them. This means that visitors and those not registered with the practice will pay anywhere from \$19.50 - to \$75 for a consult, depending on whether it is ACC, and if they have a community service card, or not. Our fees are available to look at online at www.aotea.health/fees

All debt with Aotea Health that was outstanding at 1 July 2023 (Before the change of ownership) is being wiped, but from that point forward, we are asking people to pay the minimal fee where they are able. This allows us the flexibility NOT to increase fees to try and recoup the debt not paid.

We also encourage regular users of the service to set up automatic payments to keep pace with their accounts. This can be as little as \$5 or \$10 a fortnight, depending on how often they are accessing healthcare.

There are many people on Aotea who have access to FREE healthcare due to their current health conditions. These people come under a scheme called CARE XTRA and we are funded for them for multiple appointments per year. This is why there is NOT one fee for all.

Feel free to ask clinical staff if you are eligible for this.

GARDEN IN THE SPRING

September!

Busy, busy month ahead in the garden! If you haven't already, you really must prep your beds for planting! Weather has warmed up and is predicted to stay warmer than usual for all of September and into October so you can probably get away with getting in some veggies in earlier than usual, such as zucchini and tomatoes.

Weather

Check Niwa's seasonal outlook for pupdates.

In the vege garden

Seeds to Sow for planting in October

- > Zucchini (plan on 3-4 succession plantings every 8 weeks or so).
- > Tomatoes
- Cucumbers (sow in greenhouse/very warm sunny spot)
- Beans dwarf beans will give you a puicker crop (about 4 weeks from sowing). Runners count on at least 6 weeks til crop.
- Start kūmara tipu for planting mid October onwards
- Peppers, chilis, aubergines for planting out in 6-8 weeks; protect from cold night temperatures and from rats who love the seeds, (sow in greenhouse/very warm sunny spot)
- All your greens: lettuce, silverbeet, kale, broccoli, pak choy, cabbage etc
- Herbs: parsley, basil, oregano, marjoram, dill, sage, lovage, bronze fennel, chives,garlic chives

Direct Sowing in September

- Coriander (soak seed for 24 hrs before sowing, use fresh seed)
- > Dil
- > Rocket
- > Radishes and turnips
- Peas, including sugar snaps and snow peas (until December latest)
- Carrots (soak seed for 24 hrs before sowing, use fresh seed)
- > Beetroot
- > Beans (from mid/September)

mid September)

Seedlings to Plant in September

- All your greens: : lettuce, silverbeet, kale, broccoli, pak choy, cabbage etc
- > Zucchini (plan on succession plantings every 8 weeks or so).
- Tomatoes (cherry toms often cope with early planting better than beefsteaks),
- > Basil (if it's warm), parsley
- Cucumbers from end of September (they like really warm soil)
- > Peas
- > Beans (usually mid September on)

Watch Out For

- Slugs and snails (use beer traps or iron phosphate bait)
- > Caterpillars (use nets or Bt)
- Aphids (plant alyssum, let your coriander flower!)
- Birds after your seedlings (use nets)

In the Orchard

- > Prune apples and pears
- Feed citrus with sheep pellets or chook manure (3x per year but not in winter) too late to prune as borer beetle out and about
- Mulch fruit trees while the soil is damp

Other Tasks

- Sort out your watering system for summer. If you have adequate water, set up drip tape. All fittings available at BBS and through Irrigation Express.
 - Collect/make mulch spread thickly as you plant to retain precious moisture in the soil over the coming hot months and reduce weeds.

DOES AOTEA NEED A BOAT WASH FACILITY?

and/or drop-in at the Community Boat Wash Facility: Feedback Drop-In Event at the Claris Conference Centre, 25th September from 5 - 6.30pm

Vessels that are cleaned on beaches and tidal areas are a biosecurity risk to Aotea. which is relatively marine pest free. This is one of the main reasons for finding out if some form of boat wash facility is feasible. The haul-out would aim to be a communityresidents of Aotea.

An invasive marine pest Mediterranean fanworm (Sabella spallanzanii) was found at Port Fitzroy in 2017 and since then Auckland Council's marine biosecurity team have been doing in-water surveillance at Aotea to remove fanworm, monitor for new fanworm sites as well as look out for the arrival of any other new marine pests. Early detection is key when dealing with underwater pests. the fanworm has arrived and it has been controlled. But unfortunately, it has now taken hold in the Wairahi Arm/Smokehouse Bay area spreading in Port Fitzroy.

Have your say via the online survey - Visit: The very low visibility in the Wairahi area www.surveymonkey.com/r/56T7PBM limits divers' ability to find them, and we currently lack tools to manage it now. This area is now considered to be high biosecurity risk and potentially a source of spread to other locations. Two new-to-New Zealand marine pests are also present at Aotea the ascidian Clavelina oblonga - which was picked up by our team in 2019 and is still the only known location in NZ (Smokehouse Bay & Port Fitzroy vicinity) - and the efficient invader exotic Caulerpa (multiple locations).

NATURE & ENVIRONMENT NOTICES

LOVE YOUR COMPANION CAT, LOVE **NATURE!**

Spring has sprung, which means many of our native birds will be breeding soon. A perfect time to check the health of your pet routine.

As part of the Auckland Council's Natural Environment pest management program on Aotea, Auckland Council contractors are continuing feral cat control in and around areas with significant ecological value. The program aims to reduce predation by feral cats on protected species such as pateke, bittern, petrel, dotterel, and lizards and ensure the long-term viability of threatened ecosystems. There are also community groups carrying out feral cat control across the island to help protect our native species.

Many people in our community companion cats, and they are a valued part of families, so as a responsible pet owner, how do you care for and keep your companion cat safe?



As a first step we encourage companion cat owners to keep their cats inside at night. Along with desexing, this helps to reduce the possibility of your cat wandering and predating our native taonga. It also reduces the risk of your cat getting harmed in fights or spreading/catching diseases from feral cats like toxoplasmosis. While our roads on Aotea aren't high speed, keeping your cat inside at night also reduces the chance of your companion cat getting injured or run

If you do choose to let your cat roam, ensure it is easily identifiable by placing a collar on it. Brightly coloured collars are more effective than bells at protecting birds from cats (42-54% reduction in prey capture). Cats can still catch rats when wearing these collars because rats don't have the same good colour vision.

Is your companion cat microchipped? Microchipping gives your cat a better chance of being reconnected with your family if it strays too far. Even owned cats can roam large distances, and on the mainland have been recorded wandering more than 2km in a night and tom cats even further! Microchipping and desexing are free services provided for cat owners on Aotea. Simply book your companion cat in with Anne Kernohan at GBI Vets in Claris, phone (09) 4290 0463 or 021 797 538.

Take a picture! Send a photo of your feline friend to Auckland Council along with their details so your companion can be entered into the Aotea 'Cat-alogue'. The Cat-alogue is a successful online tool used by contractors in the field, and along with the visual of a cat collar helps them quickly identify owned cats during feral cat operations and release or reunite them with their owners.

Another great tip is to feed your cat a high meat diet. A high meat diet with no grains can help to reduce prey capture and a nutritious diet will also help keep your cat healthy. Take home message: a high meat diet is good for cats and wildlife, especially when cats have access to the outdoors.

The community's ongoing support for this project has been fantastic, we are all doing our part to protect Aotea's taonga species.

SEXTONS BRIDE/RHAPHIOLEPIS **UMBELLATA: THE WEEDY WEDDING CRASHER OF AOTEA**

Sexton's bride is a perennial shrub up to approximately 3m tall. Flowers are borne in clusters of about 20 from July-December. Petals are white, stamens and sepals pink/red. Fleshy, purple to black fruit approximately 6-12mm diameter, ripen during March-April. Its seeds are dispersed by birds, it is tolerant of salt spray, wind, and drought, grows well in coastal areas and forms thick stands that crowd out other species. One to keep an eye out for and help eradicate from the Motu.

ARGENTINE ANTS

It's that time again, Argentine ant work takes off once more this month on Aotea. This project has been ongoing since 2006 and has seen a high level of success. Intense monitoring and control have enabled the eradication of four sites covering over 55 ha, including Mulberry Grove, one of the largest areas successfully eradicated of Argentine ants in New Zealand. This achievement has only been possible with the collaboration and willingness of the community, so a big thank you to residents in the work areas for enabling this mahi to be carried out on their properties for the duration of the programme

line with previous years, operational work will start in October. Firstly, targeting the warmer/dryer east coast sites and progressively moving across the motu to include all known sites. You may have seen that as part of the programme, we now have an island based Argentine ant dog and handler team carrying out surveillance work. This capability enables a greater number of sites to be quickly checked for the presence/ absence of Argentine ants. This is a timely reminder that to eradicate Argentine & Darwin's ants from Aotea, the support and participation of all island residents and visitors is crucial. The risk of new incursions of ants into the areas eradicated still exists so to safeguard against re-establishment we will be conducting periodic surveillance.

Please be careful not to transport ants to new sites. Argentine and Darwin's ant queens do not fly, so transferal and establishment at new sites occurs by moving materials that contain at least one queen ant and several workers. In relation to public roads where Argentine ants are being managed, signs have been positioned at either end of the infestation to alert everyone that there are Argentine ants present. Argentine ants can be transferred to new sites in car wrecks, garden waste, potted plants, topsoil, firewood, mulch and building materials. Please double check all goods you are moving from your property and if you do identify ants or require assistance with inspecting equipment or materials, please contact us.

Oruawharo Medlands Ecovision (OME) has received permission from DOC to begin using diphacinone, a firstgeneration anticoagulant, to control rats on DOC land in the Medlands catchment.

The pesticide will be pulsed in safe Philproof bait boxes.

The blocks we have permission for are:

- Tryphena Scenic Reserve -3 blocks within Aotea Conservation Park, two are contiguous with and to the south west of Tryphena Scenic Reserve, one is off the north west corner of

Tryphena Scenic Reserve -Medlands Wildlife Management Reserve -Oruawharo Creek Government Purpose Reserve

The first area we are targeting is the Medlands Wildlife Management Reserve, the wetland, where rat numbers are consistently high. Once tracks have been marked we will commence with this work in other permitted areas. This work will be carried out between 1 October 2024 and 1 January 2026


