TOITŪ TE TIRITI O WAITANGI

The community gathered in Rarohara / Port FitzRoy on The reclamation was bustling, filled with market stalls Thursday 6 February to celebrate Waitangi day 2025 on Aotea, including skincare enterprise Aio Tallow from Dominique led and organised by Te Motu O Aotea, Māori Womens Welfare League.

The day started with a hikoi from the Orama turn-off down to the wharf led by Nancy Tait and the Māori Womens Welfare League. Over a hundred people gathered with placards and red, black and white Tino Rangatira flags and He Whakaputanga flags to join the hikoi, accompanied by the police, FENZ and health and safety volunteers.

The signing of the Treaty of Waitangi/Te Tiriti o Waitangi - New Zealand's founding document, has been commemorated as a public holiday since 1974. A multi-day celebration is held at the Waitangi grounds and smaller events like this one on Aotea are held around the country.

The hīkoi arrived at the reclamation to a pōwhiri from kaumatua and kuia of Ngāti Rehua Ngātiwai ki Aotea. Hope Munro and Loma Cleave performed the karanga (the summon), with five kaikaranga from the league, four of whom stepped up to do the karanga for the first time.

Kaumatua Syd Davies began with an opening karakia followed by a mihi by Jeff Cleave to welcome everyone. We also had a brief korero from Fletcher Beazley, the new chair of Ngāti Rehua Ngātiwai ki Aotea Trust board and new DOC Operations competition. national conference did not disappoint with incredible hampers filled with local skincare products, local merchandise and items gifted from NZ made brands.

Kiri Toki, Ōkiwi kura alumni, Indigenous rights lawyer and daughter of Valmaine Toki (previous local board member) alongside Kelly Klink (Cultural historian) took to the stage to korero about the basic principles, visions and historical content of Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

"It is a beautiful document of hope, it makes Aotearoa unlike any other nation on the planet - it's vision should be celebrated."

"A blueprint for how Māori and the British colony were to work together, setting out a bicultural foundation. We are multicultural, but a bicultural nation which is unique and puts us on the world stage".

"Sometimes people get a little bit scared about what the treaty means to them, Māori grievances are with the Crown, not pākehā, Māori are not trying to take things away from them."

Kiri broke down some of the common misconceptions around sovereignty and rangatiratanga and encouraged people to read more than just the treaty and delve deeper into the korero and dialogue that took place across the table on the day of the signing of the Treaty in 1840.

Outlining that the korero is highly relevant and the intention clearly was a beautiful vision for the modern state of New Zealand, bringing two people together to create a new country where the strengths of two peoples could be harnessed - a true unification of two peoples.

A raffle to raise funds for the board to Kiri's vision for Aotea as a community attend the Māori womens welfare league was clear and heartfelt. Reflecting on examples of where the community and mana whenua have worked and fought together, such as in the case of the marine dumping.

> "We have such an amazing community, such amazing potential to create something truly beautiful. We all care for this island. We all care about its wellbeing. We all want to leave it in the best place for our tamariki and our descendants. I truly believe we could be an example for the rest of the country, showing what a treaty compliant community looks like. We are quite different and we have that opportunity".

Then, for the fun finale of the day - the infamous pūkana competition. The line up was strong, with a guest appearance from ex TV3 presenter Mike McRoberts. tamariki making their pūkana debut. ever the competitor Evander Sykes and pūkana competition expert Jeremiah Ngawaka.

And of course, all great days at Rarohara are concluded with excited, joy-filled tamariki doing manu's off the wharf getting in some good practice for the AFSG Manu comp on the 22 February!

Kiri Toki also joined Tim Higham on Aotea FM on Monday morning and explained more about how Te Tiriti and the history of Ngāti Rehua provide the Island with an exciting future.

We take a holistic approach to support rangatahi in building confidence, finding a sense of belonging, and fostering mental well-being. Our focus is on encouraging education engagement, strengthening healthy relationships, and providing pathways to employment and life skills.

How We Run the Programme

At KRP, our Kaiārahi (youth leaders) work closely with rangatahi and their whanau, offering one-on-one outreach, guidance, and support. We hold weekly activities outside of the Learning Hub hours-these include youth group meet-ups, sports, art sessions, community volunteering, and group workshops focused on Hauora (health and well-being). We also offer transport to make sure rangatahi can join in.

FOLLOWING OUR KĀKĀ

For most of us on Aotea, Great Barrier Island, regularly seeing kākā is par for the course, but this is not always the case. North Island kākā are considered 'at risk' (recovering), while South Island kākā are 'nationally vulnerable'. We are extremely lucky to be one of the remaining strongholds for this bird in New Zealand.

Over the last two years Windy Hill Sanctuary has teamed up with Landcare Research scientist, Neil Fitzgerald, to undertake a study on kākā dispersal and movements. The study is looking into how far kākā move from the nest they hatched in to where they themselves first breed (natal dispersal).



Ex-Windy Hill employee Henry Cookson with his dog Chase spent many hours locating new nests and using data from previous years nesting sites. He then marked the routes to each nest, established the time the birds are likely to fledge, and reported to Neil so that Landcare research could come in, which they did on two occasions, to band and put the transmitters on, with the help of Henry and current employee Paul Lee.

Nine chicks have been banded and fitted with 8 transmitters. While it may look uncomfortable for the bird, great care is taken to ensure minimal disturbance, and they are handled very gently. The linen thread that attaches the transmitter will eventually rot and allow the transmitter to fall off

The transmitter pack is fitted with 4 tiny solar batteries that power the unit. Once the birds leave the nest the sun will charge the batteries, and the birds track logs will pop up on Neils phone. They are hoping to track the birds for at least 3 years to see where they start breeding.

So where to from here? That is the question.

Happily, thanks to support from DOC, Foundation North, Auckland Council and the Lottery Grants Board - and excellent team work by trustees and our dedicated ranger Clint Stannard, we came through. I might add - came through with flying colours.

Our major funding challenge, worrying as it was, turned out to have a positive side. The crisis was motivation for the Trust which has always preferred to keep a low profile - to get out and actively make our case, highlighting the conservation gains of our island restoration work over the past 20 years. Now conservation managers have a much greater awareness of the strategic value of ship-rat free Motu Kaikōura - and the negative consequences if this hard won achievement were allowed to become undone.

Ngāti Rehua has always important for the Trust. Last year I met with old friend and the then chair of the Ngāti Rehua - Ngāti Wai ki AoteaTrust Board, Opo Ngawaka to brief him on our work. Opo has since stepped down to focus more on his conservation Ablutions block transformed after major role so we greet the incoming NRNWKA Trust Board chair Fletcher Beazley and look forward to meeting him.

biological survey was undertaken by volunteer scientists, following on from the successful 2023 survey. These have added significantly to the records of the to generous grants from the Aotea - Great Barrier Local Board, ranger Clint Stannard thereby boosting the island's gravity-fed water supply, complementing our solar powered pump system. Clint has also comprehensively renovated the toilet and shower block and also added the finishing touches to the new Lodge by crafting his own stone-work steps at the main entrance. And as well as managing our rat control operation, including ongoing intensification. Clint has also upgraded the island's main walking tracks. Tū Mai Taonga is a new conservation organization on Great Barrier proceeding under the leadership, guiding vision and tikanga of Ngāti Rehua Ngātiwai ki Aotea. The project aims to protect and restore native species and ecosystems on Aotea through feral cat

2024 was always going to be a challenging removal and intensified rat control, initially in the Aotea Conservation Park and Northern Aotea area. It is also removing rats from the neighbouring Broken Islands. The meeting was a valuable opportunity for information sharing. Makere, Clint and Mike had a useful discussion on our common cause - island restoration. The Trust fully supports Tū Mai Tāonga. A ship rat-free Motu Kaikōura is vital for safeguarding the success of Tū Mai Tāonga's rat eradication work on the Broken Islands.

Thanks to a generous grant from the Aotea-Great Barrier Local Board, a major greatly encouraged to begin 2025 with the renovation organized and to a large part carried out by our talented, multi-skilled best shape it's ever been - and very ready ranger Clint Stannard in September. The building was gutted, its plumbing, fittings and fixtures, showers, toilets, hand basin replaced or renewed, re-lined and repainted, with new custom made vanities already underway, we are beginning 2025 and benches installed, so as to transform it into a gleaming as-new facility - a fitting partner to the Lodge. Speaking of which as noted, Clint also crafted two large stonework steps at the Lodge entrance. Both facilities are ready to welcome our summer guests.
